## **ORGANISERS' PROFILES**

The Luxembourg Institute for European and International Studies (LIEIS) was created on 13 July 1990 in the context of a relationship with Harvard University. These ties began in early 1987 when Prime Minister Jacques Santer visited Harvard. Eminent scholars such as John Kenneth Galbraith, Wassily Leontief, Leonid Abalkin and Thomas Schelling attended the first meetings.

The key project of the first fifteen years was "The Vitality of Nations". Since the first meeting in March 1990 at the Castle of Bourglinster in Luxembourg, some 1,200 scholars from across the world have explored and debated the strengths and weaknesses of selected countries and regions. These conferences, of a multidisciplinary and multinational character, have endeavoured to assess, explain and forecast the vitality of countries. There have also been meetings on more specific topics related to vitality, based on manuscripts prepared by scholars such as Charles Kindleberger, William McNeill, Walt Rostow, David Landes, Mancur Olson, Angus Maddison, Christopher Coker, Andrew Kamarck and Paul Streeten. Sixteen books have been published in the context of those meetings.

Since its inception the Institute has involved students, young researchers and professionals in its endeavours, either as research assistants or participants of model parliaments. It has offered some 250 internships to students and researchers from Luxembourg and other countries.

The Institute has endeavoured to become a forum for global intellectual and academic exchange. It cooperates with a variety of actors in its field of interest to achieve these goals. Most recently it has partnered with the New Policy Forum chaired by Mikhail Gorbachev. Almost every year since 2006 the Institute organises conferences on the future of the European integration process with Robert Mundell, 1999 Nobel Laureate in Economics.

In the past years the Institute has held conferences on the implications of the European economic, financial and political crises, Russia, the situation of the Roma, the idea of the good life, and the West and the 'Arab Spring'. The two most recent conferences were "Religion, secularism, and the quest for a decent society" and "Arno J. Mayer: Critical Junctures in Modern History".

The Anglo-Serbian Society was founded in 1998 as the Anglo-Yugoslav Society. It is a non-partisan, nongovernmental and non-profit organisation aiming at educational co-operation and research in the social sciences, especially in the field of parliamentary tradition and democracy. In 2004 the Society changed its name to the Anglo-Serbian Society.

The society endeavours to improve the education of young experts in the field of social sciences, as well as to carry out research on the history of Anglo-Serbian relations. The most important activity of the Society is the International Summer School for Democracy which has been organised annually since 1998. This one-week school is organised for young experts from the field of social sciences and humanities, as well as for young political and NGO leaders. The School is organised in co-operation with domestic and foreign partners, especially with the Hellenic Observatory and LSEE of LSE.

The Society organises scholarly and research projects in the field of social, and especially political sciences, as well as conferences in the same fields. It co-operates with universities, scholarly associations and other organisations from Serbia and from abroad (especially from the United Kingdom) dealing with political science and especially parliamentary tradition and democracy, and with the research on the Balkans.

Since 2009 AnSeS has co-edited the South Slav Journal, which has been published in London since 1978.

In June 2007, the Anglo-Serbian Society and LIEIS already organised a conference entitled "Coping with shrinking: The Yugoslav and the Serbian experiences".
